NOTE:

Considering the NAAC criterions, student-teacher feed back taken from the students of teachers depicts the quality of the teachers as judged by the students and the need of updating of the knowledge by them in their respective fields. The teacher also comes to know his/her short comings and gets a chance to improve himself/herself so that the quality of education is improved for the betterment of the students.

The feedback forms were created in a standard format and about 11 questions were prepared in each format which will depict the punctuality, motivation and innovation in their respective subjects so that a proper record is kept for the particular academic year for the sake of NAAC.

As per the marking for each questions given in the quesionnaire form (feedback forms), out of 4 maximum marks for each head (punctuality, motivation and innovation) average was calculated for each head and then final average per teacher was calculated taking into account the averages obtained from each head and then final average of the institute regarding teaching performance was calculated. It comes about to be 96.01%.

Feedback from Students

A questionnaire was prepared to take feedback from parents and students. The questionnaire was divided into two parts where some of the questions were related to the Institute and the others were related to the Departments. From the scores given by the parents and the students, average and percentages were calculated. A key was prepared to assess the scores as provided by the feedback. The key is as follows:

The feedback received from the students regarding their opinion of the Institute reflects that the score percentage 73.73 % falls in the category of "Good".
