1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Proper and effective curriculum delivery to students is one of the most important primary functions of any Institute of Higher Education. The Institute being affiliated, depends for legitimizing its academic and administrative processes on Rashtrasant Tukadoji Maharaj Nagpur University, Nagpur (RTMNU). Vasantrao Naik Government Institute of Arts and Social Sciences, Nagpur, chalks out academic calendar based on the one announced by RTMNU, Nagpur for effective planning and smooth functioning of curricular and co-curricular activities. On the concluding and opening day of every academic session the staff council meeting is held. In the meeting complete planning of the new academic year along with the distribution of committees is carried out. In accordance with the decisions taken, Heads of Departments prepare and submit their academic

planning after conducting the departmental meeting. The time table committee prepares the master time table of the Institute. Based on that Heads of the Departments delegate the workload and classes among the regular faculty. For the remaining workload after the said allotment, eligible candidates are appointed on clock hour basis through the interviews conducted under the chairpersonship of the Director of the Institute. The progress of curriculum delivered is maintained in teacher's daily diary. The technological development of the modern times has contributed to the studies in Higher Education. The Institute, keeping pace with the changing scenario has taken necessary steps to have smart classrooms, Internet facilities and Wi-Fi enabled campus that facilitates teaching learning process. The information pertaining to the syllabus and other important updates are conveyed to students through social network sites, WhatsApp groups and Bulk Message groups. For better understanding of curriculum and to create interest among students, cinematic versions of literary works are screened. The students participate in Role Play and Choral Speaking. Along with the lectures of Regular/Clock Hour Basis faculty, guests lectures are arranged which add to the knowledge and make teaching learning process more effective, interesting and innovative. A Workshop is a great way to learn about a particular subject, learn new projects and methods. It helps students to achieve success in their academic environment by putting their skill in practice. Self-funded subject related workshops are organized at departmental level to clarify and explain the prescribed topics more effectively to the students. Class tests, surprise tests, classroom seminars, assignments and viva voce are conducted by various departments to monitor students' progress throughout the session. Field visits and study tours are arranged in accordance with the syllabus. The practical subjects conduct practical as per the time table provided by the university. ### 2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The system of Continuous Internal Evaluation in the institute is based on the guidelines given by RTMNU, the University of Affiliation. The learning objectives of different courses and programmes are kept in mind while designing the CIE activities. The slow and the advanced learners are identified by conduction a test of the beginning of the session. The respective subject teachers take appropriate steps keeping in mind the various needs of these learners. The Internal assessment marks are awarded by the concerned teachers who informs the students at the beginning of each semester the method he/she proposes to adopt and the scheme of marking for internal assessment. The marks are awarded on the basis of activities such as Seminar, Class tests, Preliminary examinations, home assignments, attendance and participation in study tour, field work and group discussion. The records of these activities are maintained until six months after the declaration of the results of each semester. The CIE system in the institute helps in improving the attendance of the students and facilitates their effective learning of the syllabus. The teacher employs formative assessment tools such as and induction in the classrooms, unit test, surprise test, open book test, assignment and summative assessment tools such as term end examination, practical examination and Viva-Voce to gauge the knowledge and skills acquired by the students of various levels of their programmers and courses. The question papers of the term end

examination which is conducted by the Institute are framed according to the University format. The answers book are evaluated, discussed and returned to the students with necessary suggestions. The record of these tests is maintained in the departments which are finally submitted to the concern committee. Other than the evaluation process for academic goals the students are also evaluated for the events such as NSS, NCC, Cultural and Sports. They are also encouraged to participate in inter and intra collegiate competitions. Those found well versed with language skills are given a platform to write for the annual Institutional magazine "Fulor".

#### 2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The academic calendar of the institute is prepared in accordance with RTMNU, its affiliating university's academic calendar. The main objective of preparing the academic calendar is to carry out the yearly schedule keeping in mind the maximum working days to complete the syllabus. On the basis of the institute's academic calendar, every department chalks out its own academic calendar and teaching plan for the smooth functioning of various activities such as class test, surprise test, open book test, term end examination, quiz competition, guest lectures, inauguration of department associations, seminar and parent-teacher meeting. The activities such as teaching the curriculum, revision, conduction internal and external evaluation are finished at least a week before the commencement of university examination so that students are not rushed into facing the examination. The events related to the institute's annual social gathering are also incorporated into the academic calendar. The institute's maintains flexibility while implementing its academic calendar. In case some students remain absent during internal evaluation due to their participation in extra-curricular activities or ill health, they are allowed to appear for internal evaluation on alternate dates. Thus, the institute's academic calendar facilitates the timely and periodical conduct of its yearly activities and synchronises it with the affiliating university's academic calendar. It allows the various department to maintain balance among their curricular, Co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

The Vasantrao Naik Government Institute of Arts and Social Sciences, Nagpur, is a government institution. In this institute all teaching posts are filled through Maharashtra Public Service Commission (MPSC) and non teaching posts are filled through Regional Joint Director of Higher education. The post of Director of the institute is also filled through MPSC. The Director of the institute is the head of the institution who, along with other staff members is governed by Maharashtra Civil Services Rule (MCSR). As the institution belongs to the government hence, there is also a well established system and procedure to maintain physical, academic and support facilities e.g. laboratory, library, sports complex, computers and class rooms etc. and its utilization As both old and new premises of the institute belong to government, the premises are sometimes used for meetings during Maharashtra assembly session. Some competitive exams are also conducted in the institute which are generally held on Sunday. Likewise Institute has given permission to run courses conducted by Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU) therefore, apart from other days on Sunday IGNOU classes are also conducted in the institute. The institute has four practical departments e.g. Department of Geography, Department of Home Economics, Department of Music and Department of Psychology. The above mentioned departments having more than one laboratories. All the above laboratories are used by the students. The Institute has a spacious library. As per policy decision the library of the institute is used by the students of the Institute. As the maximum departments of the institute have been declared Ph.D. research center therefore, apart from students, Ph.D. scholars also utilize the library facility. From 2015 onwards, the sports ground of the institute has been taken for Nagpur Metro Rail Project hence, at present institute has no sports ground however, till the allotment of land for sports ground is made by the government alternate arrangement for outdoor sports activities has been made. Institute has sufficient number of computers. All computers are connected through internet. Computers are kept in the office and different departments. Students have free access to all computers if required except the computers kept in the institute's office.. Institute has 42 classrooms which are as per the norms prescribed by U.G.C. Sometime classrooms are given to government department for arranging various competitive examinations which are generally conducted on Sunday. Except this, as per rule of the government, all the class rooms are used by the students of the institute for the academic purpose. As the entire building is maintained by Public Work Department (P.W.D.) therefore, the class rooms are also maintained by P.W.D. For maintaining cleanliness of the entire physical and support facilities personnel has been hired through outsourcing and through these personnel entire premises, laboratories, library, gym, computers and class rooms are cleaned. Likewise, Security guards have been also hired on outsourcing to maintain discipline in the campus and secure the premises from any untoward incident.

Education is not just confined to imparting academic knowledge to the students. It is more about holistic development. Cultural activities play a key role in the overall personality development of students. Different types of cultural activities can give different exposure to students. Activities like singing, dance, sports and other arts, promote physical wellbeing. A cultural event titled 'Zep' is organised every year to allow students to display the other side of their personality through extracurricular activities. These activities have been the important aspect of activities carried out for all round development of students at Vasant Rao Naik Government Institute of Arts and

Social Sciences. Our students for many past years have been regular participants in the cultural activity conducted at university level under the banner 'Indradhanush'. In the said event they have been bringing laurels to the Institute by finishing among the top rankers. The participants for the university organised event are selected from the mentioned cultural activity titled 'Zep', which is carried out at Institutional level. The cultural committee to organise the programs for the event is formed at the beginning of the academic session under the chairmanship of a senior Faculty. The committee chalks out the activities which are to be carried out under the banner. The activities include, poem recitation, elocution, debate, quiz contest, essay writing, mehndi design, Rangoli, etc. The said competitions are divided into six categories for which different departments are allotted the responsibility of organizing them. Though now a dome shade has been constructed to organise this event, till academic session 2018-19, particular type of arrangement like erection of stage and tent were carried out. Two different committees were formed for the purpose. The contract for this is allotted after inviting tenders from the outsources. There is a different committee, namely 'Purchase Committee', which carries out the process of inviting tenders, comparing them and allotting the work to the agency that has quoted the lowest rates. Once the contract is allotted, two other committees namely, Stage and Decoration Committee and Pandal committee are assigned the responsibility of making arrangements. These kinds of events fill students with enthusiasm that may result into an unintended thoughtless act of indiscipline. To take care of any such untoward incident different committees, for boys and girls, to maintain discipline in the performance area are formed. Similar committees are there to check the entry of students, from two separate gates for boys and girls. Under the event, one day is reserved for the sports activities. Under the leadership of the department of Physical education different committees are formed to organise these physical activities. The event culminates by distribution of prizes to the winners in the program which is conducted to install student council. We have a different committee to take care of this. Thus the event of cultural gathering, which is an integral part of learning process at Vasantrya Naik Government Institute of Arts and Social Sciences, Nagpur is being smoothly and successfully conducted through decentralization and participative management.

Under grants from RUSA 8 class rooms have been installed with sophisticated modern facilities some of the ICT tools which are regularly utilised for teaching purpose are PC, laptop, LED and LCD projector and interactive boards. The institute has constructed ramps to make access comfortable and convenient to divyangjan visitors at every entrance. There are around 60 rooms in the campus which are utilized for purpose of teaching or for departmental accommodation. There is an independent building for administrative purpose.</p>

Research and Development	<p>Research activity happens to be one of the important aspects of the teaching learning process for Social Sciences and Arts. With thirteen post graduate teaching departments and five undergraduate departments for the subjects of Humanities, research becomes an integral part of any program prescribed in this stream by the university , Keeping this in view special efforts were taken to have a research centre where the students with a masters degree in post graduation can carry on with research activity.</p>
Examination and Evaluation	<p>The institute conducts offline internal unit tests regularly for the students at the undergraduate level pursuing B.A. Programme. The teacher used to announce the schedule of examinations and one hour unit test used to be conducted on the scheduled day. Each student has to answer the questions in a descriptive manner covering the syllabus designed for the scheduled period. There used to be evaluation of the students based on the performance in various unit tests which cover syllabus at par with RTMNU university syllabus for B.A. This helps the students to prepare for the descriptive nature of the semester based theory exams conducted by RTM Nagpur University at the end of the semester. The students too have to attend practical unit tests to enhance their skills in the practical experiments. This helps them to be confident in the university practical exams which are held at the end of the semester around the theory exams. Students refer the previous years semester exams and brush up their knowledge for getting better perfection.</p>
Teaching and Learning	<p>The Institute provides a unique blend of subjects like experiential learning through Music, Geography, Home-economics Psychology with modern Classical languages (8 Languages), with another combination with subject like Sociology, Philosophy, Economics, Political Science, History, Ancient Indian History, Culture Archeology. These collaborated with either NCC,NSS or sports brings about an individual who is balanced in his approach to life.</p>

Curriculum Development	<p>The teaching begins with a bridge course as the chapter completes the concepts are related to real life situation and the application is explained through experiential learning where ever possible. Active participation through group discussion and group assignment completion is done. During online teaching students were given assignments/ problems which they had to solve with the help of others. Every class ends with dealing with doubts and questions which the learner has. University syllabus has project work and field visits which are mandatory. Ours is a learner centered pedagogy, notes and other learning materials were shared in google classroom/ WhatsApp and even sent through emails.</p>

The submission of question papers in soft copy is done through official government email id which has been provided by the National Information center.

#### Planning and Development

In Planning and Development, most of the activities are carried out under the banner of District Planning Committee (DPC). All the work related to DPC has to be proposed through I-pass, the e-governance portal of DPC. It is approved for the planning for next financial year. For it estimate from concern bodies, like PWD for civil work, has to be submitted on the said portal. It is electronically communicated to Higher Education Department for technical sanction. This all is uploaded on a I-pass for administrative approval. Then the collector releases funds on BDS. The fund is transferred to the concerned agency. After completion of work, completion certificate and Geotag Photograph are uploaded to ipass portal. Thus the complete process of Planning and development undergoes through e governance.

<p>Available land is in the town with a limit of 0.6 Acres. Due to high crowds in the city it is very difficult to have green belt development within the campus. However, institute has still around 357 trees with girth more than 30 cm and about, 80 in form of pot gardening to have rich green effect. The individual trees belonging to 51 species of 21 families were studied for estimation of biomass and carbon sequestration Leguminosae is the most dominant family with 12 species of trees growing in the campus. Polyalthia Longifolia has the maximum number of individuals i.e. 52 on the campus. (Academic residential campus together). Maximum girth gained by Azadirachta indica which is 576 cm of 21 individuals. Dalbergia lanceolaria has achieved maximum height i.e. 94.42 ft. Total biomass of Azadirachta indica is 125187.26 and the carbon sequestered is 57586.14 kg. Total biomass of trees and carbon sequestered is 712688 kg and 327836 respectively. This biomass is accumulated over the past 10 years approximately and it is understood that within those years this much carbon has been slinked, preventing it from escaping into the atmosphere and has been</p>

fixed by these plants. Carbon dioxide is a green-house gas found naturally in the atmosphere. Due to human activities like industrial development, urbanization, fossil fuel burning (Vehicular pollution) the proportions of CO<sub>2</sub> in the atmosphere are increasing rapidly across the globe. This in turn is leading to a cascade of environmental changes better known as global warming. The trees of campus of Vasantrao Naik Institute of Arts and Social Science having successfully sinked the 327836 kgs of carbon from the atmosphere, provide a valuable ecosystem service in the heavy traffic area of central Nagpur. To meet the future demands of energy and the pollution free conscious environment for the future population, it is required to adopt non-conventional renewable sources of energy. The institute has 28 solar lights Energy audit has been conducted and the recommendation has also been implemented specifically for replacement of regular tubes and bulbs with LED bulbs and tubes. Major sources of Solid waste are from the canteen and stationary wastes. The food waste is treated by dumping in pit. General solid waste i.e. stationary waste is segregated as paper waste, plastic waste. Since the organization is well established and equipped with the necessary and up-to-date electronic infrastructure, the e-waste generation is very minimal. However, as a proactive initiative, an authorized vendor is identified for disposal of e-waste in case it is generated. E-waste after generation is segregated from other sources and kept separately identified for disposal in systematic way through proper government procedure.

## 7.2 – Best Practices

### 7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

**BEST PRACTICE :01 Title of Practice: Sickle Cell Counseling Initiative Goal:** Related to students To provide support to students with sickle cell disease (SCD). To give tips to teachers on what can be done to support students with SCD. To improve health status and quality of life of sickle cell anemia student. To seek medical care for students with sickle cell disease. The Context Sickle cell disease is an inherited disorder of the red blood cells. In sickle cell disease, the red blood cells become distorted and look C-shaped, like a sickle. Sickle cells die early, which leads to anemia. Signs of anemia include: • pale skin • tiring easily • feeling lightheaded, dizzy, or short of breath • trouble paying attention • fast heart rate Also, these sickle-shaped blood cells tend to get stuck in narrow blood vessels and clog blood flow. This can cause severe pain and organ damage. People with sickle cell disease are at risk for some bacterial infections. Students with sickle cell disease may: • need to go to the school nurses office and take medicine to help manage pain • need to drink water throughout the day to avoid dehydration, which increases sickling of red blood cells • be tired in class and need occasional rests from classroom activities • need to have classroom air temperature adjusted to avoid becoming overheated or too cold, which can trigger episodes of pain • have symptoms that need immediate medical care, such as: o severe pain o chest pain o trouble breathing o fever o jaundice or paleness o extreme tiredness o swelling of hands and feet o severe headaches o seizures o other neurologic symptoms (such as sudden vision changes, slurred speech, weakness or inability to move a part of the body, or loss of consciousness) The Practice Teachers are made aware that students with SCD may miss class time or be absent for doctor visits or hospital stays and so give these students special consideration regarding missed instruction, assignments, and testing. At times chronic fatigue or pain can make it appear that students arent motivated to learn in such cases teachers are advised to know students well can help them make an accurate assessment. Students with SCD may not be able to play contact sports or participate in strenuous exercise in such cases teachers are asked to check with their parents. Otherwise, encourage them to participate in moderate physical exercise and other institute activities. For field visits and tours student are allowed to carry a bottle of water and take bathroom breaks. They are allowed breaks from instruction and activities when necessary. Teachers are asked to ask students to avoid outdoor activities when its very hot or very cold and to be prepared in case a student has any symptoms that need medical care right away. The friends of students with SCD are told as follows "Your friend's day-to-day life is different from yours the things you take for granted, they might find difficult so it is important that you show understanding and offer them support when they need it. They don't need wrapping in cotton wool, and probably don't want to be treated any differently to anyone else, but now that you know a bit more about sickle cell disease, it should help you to understand your friend's condition and support them if they need it". Under the government initiative we at Institution level were asked to conduct a Sickle cell detection Programme. In which 1153 students teaching and

non teaching staff participated out of which 29 students were identified with Sickel Cell Disease. The students were guided by physician who elaborated on the characteristics of the disease. She further informed the students about various government facilities provided to individuals detected with this disease. On 3/4/2018 the committee distributed smart card provided by government which had Sickel Cell code according to which government policies will be available to the card holders a pamphlet on Nutritious diet was prepared and distributed to these students. Evidence of Success Students with the condition now understand the hazards of the problem. The attendance in programs specially dedicated for them has increased. The students are asked to bring their friends along so that even they know how to be of help to persons with this condition.

Problems Encountered and Resources required: Some students show Denial and do not accept the problem so they avoid and be absent from any program done for them. Collaboration needs to be made with doctors and workers working in this field. Special funds require

BEST PRACTICE: 02 Title of Practice: Creation of Citizen Manifesting Potentials Objective: Educational Institutes should help students to overcome their feeling of powerlessness by developing their sense of community and their confidence that they can make a difference in the world. The practice of teacher-mentor was initiated in the Institute with an aim to transform and empower students, the majority of who come from diverse backgrounds of underprivileged sections. To achieve its goal, this kind of activity, demands personal attention on a student. The basic feature of mentoring is the exclusive relationship mentor-mentee: mentor is somebody more experienced who provides strategic advice to facilitate the personal and professional development of another, less experienced person i.e. mentee. So the objective of this practice was to facilitate self-growth, self-worth and actualization of potential of the students by allowing them to share experiences that make them uncomfortable.

The Context It was realised that that the dropout rate in the Institute was quite high and students were in need of encouragement and facilitation for their participation in co- curricular or other activities. On discussions and deliberations with a few students it came out that their difficulties could be attended and resolved through interaction with teachers. Taking cognizance of the issue, IOAC gave it an elaborated serious thought and a practice with its basic motive to delve in students problems and if required, to get more involved in their lives and help them to draw a strategy to overcome their daily hassles was drawn. The Practice In this perspective, the role of a teacher would be of the mentor who not only coaches, teaches and supervises but also advises, leads and helps socialization of the pupil. The process commences right at the entry of the student to the Institute as a candidate seeking admission to the first year under graduation program. Candidates come seeking admission aiming to have careers that would not only provide them bread and butter but also work satisfaction. However coming directly from school level they are amateur to understand the subjects they should pursue to have Career of their choice. Taking a cognizance of this, teachers from variant departments are included in the admission committee for the first year of the under graduation program. The candidates are individually counseled and offered subjects in accordance to their interest and inclination.

After fulfilling the process of admission to the institute we move to the faculty advisor system. Here, some fifteen to twenty students are assigned to a faculty member for both academic advising as well as some conversation around other life issues. For any relation to thrive the first and foremost requirement is to listen patiently and attentively, to break the ice so that there is flowing of information from students to mentor and vice versa. Admission to a college is a financial impossibility for many. There are

children whose families can't afford to provide them with graduate degrees. If the students are dedicated enough to learn, they have to earn themselves. In such matters students coming from poor financial background but with inclination to study are identified and offered involvement into activities that would fetch them pocket money. Evidence of Success The whole idea of this scheme had come out after academic audits revealed abnormally high dropout rate of the students. The immediate aim of the activity was to decrease the drop-out rate and to provide the surrounding that can help students to derive optimum benefits through the guidance that helps them achieve their goals. Problems Encountered and Resources required There has been a significant increase in the working hours of the teaching staff due to involvement in mentoring. Thus the teachers are overworked. It is too gradual a process and when midterm feedback is obtained on the matter they tend to give very superficial positive remarks. The relationship between student-teachers is very delicate, and it has been observed in some cases even cold and lame. Mentors do not feel very motivated by their work and this is one of the reasons why the process of mentoring becomes disputable for them.

The Institution has gained a reputation of being one of the remarkable places where academic and cultural activities go together. There are cultural activities conducted at Departmental, Institutional and Inter-collegiate level throughout the year which are a source of motivation, encouragement and participation of students in Indradhanushya which is organized at State level, then Zonal level cultural competition followed by cultural competitions at National and International level.
